Author's Note

This novella began with a question: What happens when access becomes a credential?

We live in an era of verification. Background checks, credit scores, social media audits, reputation systems, wellness attestations, community standards enforcement. Each system promises safety, transparency, accountability. Each system creates a record. Each record outlives the moment that created it.

I wanted to understand what it feels like to be processed by such a system. Not from the outside, not as critique, but from the inside, through the documents themselves. What does the form look like? What does the memo say? What does the system log record when you wait in the rain?

The Fractional Fiction methodology gave me a way in. By synthesizing three public domain texts, each dealing with institutional authority and individual resistance, I could build a bureaucratic apparatus that felt both historically grounded and disturbingly contemporary.

Martin Luther's 95 Theses provided the structure of reform from within: numbered propositions posted to the institutional door, demanding that the church admit what it was doing. The theses in this novella echo that form.

Jefferson Davis's declaration provided the rhetorical DNA of exclusion dressed as protection: the language of states' rights, voluntary participation, and procedural legitimacy that encoded slavery while claiming moral authority. The CTAA speaks in that register.

Sergei Eisenstein's Battleship Potemkin provided the documentary frame and the montage logic: institutional violence captured in fragments, individual suffering rendered as data, the accumulation of small cruelties into collective indictment.

The result is not allegory. The Civic Trust & Access Authority is not a stand-in for any existing institution. It is an extrapolation, a plausible machine, a system that could exist and perhaps already does in pieces we have not yet assembled.

The horror of this novella is not dramatic. No one is tortured. No one disappears. The horror is that everything works exactly as designed. The horror is that the people operating the system believe they are doing good. The horror is that the participant, Jonah, does everything right and is still ground down by the gap between the status line and the door.

I wrote this for anyone who has been told "This is not a denial" while being denied. I wrote it for anyone who has stood at a desk, waiting for the screen to resolve their fate. I wrote it for the analysts who write the theses and the participants who sign the scripts.

The record is the reality. The record is also a lie.

Section 0.1 - Purpose

The Community Standards Code establishes minimum expectations of conduct required to preserve safe, dignified participation in services and spaces administered by or in partnership with the Civic Trust & Access Authority.

The Code is intended to: 1. Reduce the incidence and severity of community harm. 2.

Provide clear definitions and consistent procedures. 3. Establish reviewable standards for

decisions affecting access.

Section 0.2 - Scope

This Code applies to: - Digital services administered by or integrated with the Authority. -

Physical spaces and services governed by participating partners, where access decisions

are informed by the Authority's Standards processes. - Interactions and behaviors reasonably connected to the safety, integrity, and participation of the community.

Section 0.3 - Definitions

For purposes of this Code:

Community means persons and entities participating in Authority-administered services and spaces, including residents, visitors, service providers, and partner organizations.

Access means the ability to enter, use, and participate in services and spaces administered by the Authority or by participating partners.

Harm means conduct that materially increases the likelihood of intimidation, coercion, targeted humiliation, or disruption of safe participation, whether in physical spaces or via

digital channels, and whether by direct act or coordinated amplification.

Civility means conduct that permits participation without sustained humiliation, intimidation, or coercive targeting. Civility is assessed by observable behaviors, not by ideology, belief, or private thought.

Threat means an expressed or implied intention to cause physical injury, economic injury, reputational sabotage, or coordinated disruption directed at a person or group.

Targeted harassment means repeated, directed conduct that a reasonable person would understand as intended to intimidate, isolate, or degrade a person's ability to participate.

Coordinated abuse means two or more persons acting in concert to amplify threats, harassment, or coercion, including through distribution of identifying information, mobilization of third parties, or sustained reporting campaigns.

Remediation means the process by which a person may restore compliance, including training, acknowledgment of Standards, and demonstrated behavioral change.

Section 0.4 - Principles of Implementation

In implementing this Code, the Authority shall seek: 1. Consistency of definition and procedure. 2. Proportionality of response. 3. Documentation sufficient to permit review. 4.

Timely decisions to preserve safety.

Section 0.5 - Standards Governance

Standards shall be developed and revised through the Standards Council, which includes

internal members and community partners. Revisions may be issued as updates, clarifications, or guidance notes.

Q1: What is the Civic Trust & Access Authority? A: The Authority is a partnership that aligns public responsibility with private capability to protect safe participation across services and spaces. It establishes Community Standards, publishes procedures, and coordinates review mechanisms so that access can be protected consistently.

Q2: Is this a government agency or a private company? A: The Authority is a public-partnered entity with statutory oversight responsibilities and operational partnerships. The public can expect transparency in standards, procedures, and review pathways.

Q3: Are you policing speech? A: No. The Authority does not regulate beliefs or ideology. It addresses behaviors that produce sustained harm, intimidation, or coercive targeting. Speech remains free. Harassment is not.

Q4: Who writes the Standards? A: Standards are developed through the Standards Council with internal expertise and community partner participation. The process includes public consultation and outcome measurement.

Q5: What safeguards exist against bias or overreach? A: Decisions must be documented, reviewable, and consistent with published definitions. The Authority maintains oversight audits, partner accountability requirements, and correction pathways where errors are identified.

Q6: Are people being denied access to essential services because of online disputes? A: The Authority focuses on safety-relevant behaviors and sustained harm patterns. Decisions are proportionate, evidence-based, and designed to prevent intimidation and exclusion. The goal is to protect participation, not to punish disagreement.

Q7: What does "harm" mean? A: Harm is defined in the Standards Code and includes intimidation, coercion, targeted humiliation, and coordinated abuse that disrupts safe

participation. Harm is assessed by observable behavior and its impact on community participation.

Q8: What due process exists for someone accused of a violation? A: Individuals have access to published procedures, notice of relevant standards, and remediation pathways designed to restore compliance. The Authority supports consistent review mechanisms across partners.

Q9: What data does the Authority use? A: The Authority uses safety-relevant information within privacy and security constraints, with an emphasis on minimization and documentation. We do not discuss specific data sources in individual cases.

Q10: Is there an appeals process? A: The Authority provides review pathways and remediation processes. Where partner services are involved, review mechanisms are coordinated to ensure consistency and prevent contradictory outcomes.

Q11: What would you say to those who believe this creates a “social credit system”? A: Civility and safety are not social status. They are the minimum conditions for participation without fear. The Authority exists to prevent coercion and intimidation from governing public life.

Q12: How will you measure success? A: Success is measured by reduced harm, increased safe participation, decreased intimidation events, and improved consistency of outcomes. The Authority will publish periodic reports.

Civility Certified is a Trust Badge for ordinary life.

Civility Certified is a voluntary community credential designed to support safe participation across civic, commercial, and social services in partnership with the Civic Trust & Access Authority.

Certification indicates that a participant has demonstrated: - Familiarity with Community

Standards. - Commitment to non-coercive participation. - Completion of basic safety and participation training.

Civility Certified does not assess private beliefs. It does not reward conformity. It exists to

preserve the minimum conditions under which strangers can share space without dread.

What the badge does

At participating locations and services, Civility Certified is displayed as a Trust Badge. Visually, the badge is a small circular seal : a clean ring enclosing a stylized checkmark, paired with the word CERTIFIED in plain capitals. In the app it appears in the upper-right

corner of a participant card; on printed confirmations it sits beside the participant name; at

partner desks it appears as a single green indicator dot beside the status line, visible to staff at the moment of scan.

It may appear as: - A digital badge in the CTAA Service App. - A scannable code on a printed confirmation. - A credential indicator visible to partner access desks during check-in. - A “Certified” status note on integrated partner portals.

The badge is not an honorific. It is an access indicator tied to baseline training completion

and current review status. It is a signal to staff that you have completed baseline modules, understand the review pathway, and have agreed to conduct boundaries that protect participation for others.

A note for those who worry about “social credit”: Civility Certified is not a ranking system.

It does not score virtue. It does not promise privilege. It is a baseline safety credential intended to reduce intimidation and restore ordinary participation.

Why the community needs this now

Modern participation is integrated. A single evening can involve an employer portal, a transit gate, a venue desk, a payment terminal, and a community meeting sign-in. When intimidation or harassment occurs, it often crosses these spaces. The consequence is not

simply discomfort. The consequence is retreat: people stop showing up.

Civility Certified is designed to rebuild the confidence that makes public life possible.

Civility Certified helps: - Reduce intimidation and harassment events in shared spaces. - Restore participation for those previously excluded by hostility and sustained targeting. -

Provide clear pathways for remediation when standards are violated. - Improve fairness and consistency across partner decisions.

What Civility Certified means and does not mean

Civility Certified means: - You completed required training modules. - You agreed to the

Community Standards Code. - You understand your rights and responsibilities. - You completed a scenario-based participation assessment. - You understand how to request review if a partner decision affects your access.

Civility Certified does not mean: - You are morally superior. - You are guaranteed admission to every event. - You cannot be reviewed or corrected. - Your private opinions are monitored.

How to become Civility Certified

Most participants can complete the certification process in a single session.

1. Review the Community Standards.
2. Complete Civility Certified training modules.
3. Complete the Participation Assessment.
4. Receive certification status and review guidance.

You may complete modules online, at partner sites, or at designated community centers.

If I lose certification, can I restore it?

Yes. Civility Certified includes remediation pathways designed to restore safe participation.

Remediation may include: - Additional training. - Acknowledgment of Standards. - Participation coaching. - A defined period of demonstrated compliance.

Civility Certified is designed to increase belonging, not to create permanent exclusion.

Privacy and data practices

The Authority uses safety-relevant information within privacy and security constraints. Data is minimized. Decisions are documented to permit review. The Authority does not publish individual histories.

Your badge shows status, not your story.

A note on dignity

Civility Certified asks for the simplest thing that makes a community possible: restraint. It

asks you to disagree without humiliating, to complain without coercing, to report without

weaponizing the report itself.

If you believe the badge is being used as a gate rather than a baseline, request review.

The program exists to protect access.

1. Executive Summary

Civility Certified is positioned publicly as voluntary and inclusion-oriented. However, partner integration will create adoption pressure. As a practical matter, certification status

will become a friction-reducing proxy for access decisions even in contexts where no direct safety incident exists.

The program's principal risks are ethical and legitimacy risks: the lived possibility that "certification" functions as moral sorting while being defended as safety, thereby producing exclusion under the pretense of protection.

The credential's salience occurs at points of friction: gates, desks, congestion, disputes, and resource scarcity. In those moments, the badge becomes shorthand.

2. Adoption Pressure (Partner Dynamics)

Although certification is voluntary, participating partners will predictably treat Civility Certified as: - A default for entry decisions during congestion and high volume. - A risk triage signal in resource-constrained settings. - A liability mitigation mechanism in contested environments. - A shortcut for staff who cannot afford to argue.

These incentives will produce de facto requirements without formal mandate. This effect

will be most pronounced in events, appointment windows, and other limited-capacity services, precisely where vulnerability and scarcity are highest.

3. Access Coupling (Cross-Domain Effects)

Partner integration will link certification status to: - Event admission and venue entry. - Priority routing in congested transit contexts. - Allocation of appointment slots and service

windows. - Housing partner screening parameters. - Employment partner eligibility checks. - Marketplace visibility and commerce tools.

This coupling increases potential effectiveness but expands harm surface area. A review

hold or administrative condition can propagate across domains and produce consequences disproportionate to the initiating conduct category. The program's promise

is access protection. The program's failure mode is access rationing by status.

4. Evidence Standards and Pattern Analytics (Interpretation Risk)

The rubric permits pattern analyses. Pattern analytics reduce random inconsistency but introduce interpretive risk:

- "Targeting" can be inferred from repetition and proximity even where intent is disputed.

- “Coordinated abuse” can be inferred from temporal clustering and shared language even where coordination is emergent rather than planned.
- Reporting misconduct can be inferred from reporting volume even where reporting is defensive and harm persists.

Recommendation: require documented human rationale for pattern-based triggers, including alternate hypotheses and proportionality justification.

5. Remediation as Ritual (Legitimacy Risk)

Remediation is framed as restoration. In practice, remediation requirements can become

a performative ritual: - Scripted acknowledgments. - Admissions not proportionate to evidenced conduct. - “Coaching” that penalizes dissent. - Tone assessments that substitute for safety assessment.

Recommendation: constrain remediation to behavior and measurable participation safety

outcomes. Prevent ideological drift. Avoid language that functions as confession.

6. Moral Sorting and Self-Concept (Coalition Risk)

Certification encourages a “clean hands” culture among staff and partners. Under pressure, humans seek moral clarity. Moral clarity becomes categorical. Categorical judgment becomes punitive drift.

Recommendation: emphasize fallibility, reversible decisions, and audit humility. Publish error-correction metrics alongside safety metrics. Train staff to resist equating institutional

audit defensibility with moral innocence; the program’s ethics depend on the capacity to

admit and repair error.

7. Communications Alignment

Public communications should not promise a world without discomfort. If the program is

oversold as harmony, the inevitable conflict of real community will be interpreted as failure and will drive harsher enforcement.

Recommendation: frame civility as minimal conditions, not moral perfection.

8. Immediate Action Items (before broad partner rollout)

- Add explicit language to public materials clarifying that certification is not a moral

hierarchy.

- Create a disproportionate-impact monitoring protocol for cross-domain propagation.
- Require partner attestations that certification status is not the sole criterion for essential services access.
- Implement a red-team review of remediation scripts for coercive content.
- Require partner training on uniform policy versus special conditions.

Closing note The credibility of Civility Certified will depend on whether the Authority can

demonstrate, in the lived experience of ordinary people, that certification is a safety instrument rather than a ranking system.

Operational guidance (excerpt): - Do not promise thresholds you cannot bind. Do not invent exceptions you cannot defend. - Use pattern analytics to check for repeat behavior

and for prior remediation. - Separate “reported impact” from “verified action.” Record both. - When pressured, repeat the process: identify the Standard, document the record,

route to escalation lane if severity triggers. - When accused, do not argue. Do not editorialize. Document.

Instructor (closing): Discipline keeps the record usable. A usable record keeps the program defensible.

2. Definitions

Pattern trigger means an automated or semi-automated alert generated by the Integrity Console indicating a probability of targeted harassment, coordinated abuse, or coercive disruption based on repetition, targeting, proximity, and cross-domain propagation.

3. Trigger Conditions (non-exhaustive)

A pattern trigger may be generated when any of the following thresholds are met:

PTP-7.1 Repetition Threshold - 5 or more incidents referencing the same target within 14 days, across one or more partner domains.

PTP-7.2 Target Convergence Threshold - 3 or more distinct accounts referencing the same target with overlapping language markers within 7 days.

PTP-7.3 Cross-Domain Propagation Threshold - 2 or more partner domains initiating holds within 48 hours for related conduct categories.

PTP-7.4 Reporting Cluster Threshold - 20 or more reports originating from accounts linked by shared interaction graphs within 72 hours.

4. Required Analyst Actions

Upon receipt of a pattern trigger, the assigned Standards Compliance Analyst shall:

A. Confirm whether the triggering data includes plausible alternate hypotheses (e.g., legitimate reporting surge due to a public incident). B. Document rationale for classification, including why alternate hypotheses are accepted or rejected. C. Apply proportionality analysis with explicit reference to participation impact. D. Determine whether immediate cross-domain holds are necessary to prevent contradictory outcomes.

E. If uncertainty remains, escalate to Review Panel within SLA.

5. Prohibited Analyst Actions

Analysts shall not: - Rely solely on a numeric score without documented rationale. - Treat

pattern triggers as proof of intent. - Expand scope beyond defined conduct categories without Standards Council guidance.

6. Notes on Human Factors

Under pressure, analysts may seek moral clarity. Moral clarity can become punitive.

Analysts are reminded that the purpose of pattern triggers is consistency, not vengeance.

The note is meant as a guardrail. The thresholds are meant as humility. Yet the existence of a threshold is also an invitation: a way to turn fear into a number, a number into a record, and a record into permission.

If we maintain holds across essential services, we risk coupling inconvenience with deprivation. However, if we override a partner, we create a safety liability they will not accept. Pattern trigger exists, but pattern is built on "tone" proxies. Standards require observable behavior, not vague affect. The partners are using civility language as a risk substitute.

Decision window: 17 minutes.

E. Action Options (Console)

1. Maintain hold (pending remediation)
2. Maintain hold (pending review panel)
3. Release hold with conditions
4. Release hold (override partner)
5. Escalate (immediate)

The system presents “options” the way a locked door presents “choices.” The analyst can select

among procedural fates. Each fate has consequences in rooms the analyst will never enter.

The partner wants guidance that will let them continue the day without argument. The console

wants a rationale that will satisfy review. The participant is absent except as a status line, a set of

fragments, and the knowledge that an appointment window, once missed, is rarely recovered

without cost.

respectable.

§ 13. Voluntary Participation (a) Participation in the credential infrastructure is voluntary. (b) Partners shall not be required to accept a participant whose credential status line indicates a stability procedure. (c) A participant may opt out by declining the credential. A participant who opts out may be offered alternate service pathways subject

to partner capacity.

§ 14. Data Sharing and Records (a) Partners may submit incident reports, staff anticipation logs, and operational notes to the Authority for the purpose of stability governance. (b) The Authority may retain such records. Deletion requests are advisory. (c) Drafts, metadata, and system-generated correlation artifacts may be retained as part

of record integrity.

§ 15. Safe Harbor (a) A Partner acting in reliance on a propagated credential permission

set shall be deemed to have complied with reasonable safety practice. (b) The Authority shall indemnify Partners acting within authorized permissions.

§ 16. Appeals (a) The Authority shall maintain a Resolution Pathway to provide

resources, clarifications, and scope review. (b) The Resolution Pathway is not a court. No

participant is entitled to binding thresholds at the point of service.

§ 17. Oversight (a) Oversight holds shall not be released except by disposition of the Integrity Review Tribunal or successor body. (b) Oversight records are released only by tribunal disposition.

That belongs in training and in the guidance deck. Counsel-3: Define “urgent care” in

Thesis 11, or partners will claim everything is urgent. SCA-0147: We can define minimum

access categories. Chair-CWG: I want this operationalized into guidance notes and

partner annex language. Liaison-22: There will be blowback. Partners like hidden flags.

Chair-CWG: Partners like predictability. We can sell predictability.

The tracked changes shimmer on the screen like a mild weather pattern.

Civility means conduct that permits participation without sustained humiliation, intimidation, or coercive targeting. Civility is assessed by observable behaviors, not by ideology, belief, or private thought. [Civility is a threshold for participation safety, not a moral rank.]

The sentence is true. It is also a shield. “Threshold” sounds humble. “Threshold” sounds minimal. “Threshold” sounds like a guardrail, not a throne.

In practice, thresholds decide who can enter the building.

Harm means conduct that materially increases the likelihood of intimidation, coercion,

targeted humiliation, or disruption of safe participation, whether in physical spaces or via

digital channels, and whether by direct act or coordinated amplification. [Harm shall be

assessed primarily by observable behavior and participation impact.] [Affect descriptors (“tone,” “hostility”) may be recorded but shall not substitute for documented conduct categories.]

Affect is denied sovereignty. It is not removed. It remains, as a field that “may be recorded,” waiting for the moment when partners insist that their discomfort must count

as harm because discomfort is what they can document quickest.

Reporting integrity means use of reporting tools in good faith to reduce harm and preserve safe participation. [Reporting integrity does not prohibit repeated reporting where a participant reasonably believes harm persists or is ignored.] [Reporting misconduct means use of reporting tools to intimidate, coerce, or retaliate against participation.] Reporting volume may indicate misconduct. [Reporting volume may be a signal requiring review; classification requires documented rationale and alternate hypotheses.]

The deletion is the closest thing to mercy a tracked change can offer. It removes the automatic guilt of volume. It replaces it with a softer danger: “signal,” “review,” “alternate

hypotheses.” Words that sound cautious and fair.

The risk is that uncertainty is always resolved in the direction of the institution’s fear.

Farther down, a new clause appears without fanfare.

Status language means standardized terms used to communicate certification outcomes. [Status language shall not materially misrepresent ongoing conditions affecting participation.]

This sentence, if obeyed, would change the story the institution tells.

It would mean that “RESTORED” cannot coexist with a hidden flag that permits propagation. It would mean that a person’s badge cannot be green while their status is being queried as risk. It would mean that legibility belongs, at least in part, to the participant.

It is precisely the sort of sentence that will provoke the fiercest smile in a working group

meeting: the smile of someone who agrees in principle and will oppose in practice.

The annex is where ethics becomes contract.

It is where “voluntary” becomes a clause in an agreement that partners will interpret according to their own risk appetites.

The draft begins with a sentence so polite it could be mistaken for restraint.

1. Non-Exclusivity (formal) Partners acknowledge that Civility Certified status is not the sole criterion for access decisions.

“Acknowledge” is a verb with no teeth.

The next clause offers teeth, then dulls them with an exception.

2. Access Coupling Disclosure Partners acknowledge that certification status may propagate across domains and agree to: - Provide notice to participants where certification status materially influences access outcomes, except where disclosure would create immediate safety risk . - Maintain internal records sufficient for review by CTAA.

The exception is the institution’s universal solvent. “Immediate safety risk” can mean a credible threat. It can also mean “a difficult conversation at a desk.” It can also mean “the

partner prefers not to be argued with.”

The annex creates Minimum Access Categories like a small bill of rights.

3. Minimum Access Categories (MAC) Partners agree to honor minimum access categories notwithstanding review holds, absent verified threats:

MAC-1: Urgent care services MAC-2: Essential transit to medical appointments MAC-3:

Time-limited access to retrieve personal property MAC-4: Access to legal counsel and

review pathways MAC-5: Emergency shelter intake

The list is moral in its intent and bureaucratic in its form. It is the Authority's attempt to

draw a line it can defend.

The danger is not that the list exists. The danger is that the list will be interpreted narrowly

by those with the power to interpret: the partner at the door.

"Urgent care services" will become "only if you are bleeding."

"Essential transit" will become "not during congestion."

"Time-limited access" will become "not tonight."

"Access to counsel" will become "by appointment."

"Emergency shelter" will become "try another intake."

The annex anticipates the drift and tries to correct it with a phrase that sounds practical.

4. Review Hold Handling Where a review hold exists, partners agree to: - Limit denial scope to the initiating conduct context where feasible. - Avoid cross-domain propagation

by default; propagation requires CTAA rationale entry.

And then, in the most honest clause of the annex, the institution names what it usually hides behind "voluntary."

5. Adoption Pressure Acknowledgment Partners acknowledge that operational convenience may create de facto mandates. Partners shall not advertise Civility Certified

as a requirement for essential services.

The clause is both confession and inoculation. It admits the obvious. It also allows the institution to later say: we warned them. We required acknowledgment. We acted.

The world may still behave otherwise. The record will remain clean.

The recommendation offers a compromise that sounds like wisdom.

Create a new phrase.

Not “RESTORED” when monitoring is active, but something that will keep the record defensible without igniting the participant.

“Certified (Active, Under Review Protocol).”

Later, this phrase will be rebranded again. Words will keep changing, as though a new label can prevent the old function.

The memo ends with an axiom that could be moral if it were not also strategic.

Fairness requires legibility. Legibility must be balanced against operational security.

Balance is always the institution’s word for control.

Propagate emergency permissions by default to all partners. Fragmentation produces confusion and liability. If one partner refuses and another admits, the program

appears incoherent.

Publish the success narrative as “modernized safety.” Do not call it “interception.”

Call it “support.”

If we keep the instrument narrow, we will be blamed for what it misses.

If we expand the instrument, we will be praised for what it prevents.

The math is clear.

Proceed accordingly.

A single true-positive event becomes a moral currency.

It buys the institution permission to widen the net.

The same confidence score that once justified a narrow emergency now justifies a permanent expansion.

And when the next false positive is filed, the record will cite HS-771233 as precedent.

The note ends with the line that cannot be rewritten into policy without changing the system's heart.

Proportionality in a gate system is still a gate.

Overall: This is usable. It is specific. It reduces ambiguity. Ambiguity is our liability.

Ambiguity is not a liability to justice. Ambiguity is a liability to control.

The line lands like a gavel. Clarity is power.

We will implement these updates without losing sight of our mission: protect participation without fear.

Further guidance will follow from the Standards Council Secretariat.

Manager Note: While staff comfort is not safety, staff intuition may be recorded as a risk-relevant signal when corroborated by conduct.

Document. Justify. Apply proportionality.

Remember: consistency is compassion only when the Standard is correctly interpreted.

To maintain partner participation at scale, the following are required:

Actionable refusal rights. Partners must be able to refuse service when a participant is flagged under Review Protocol, Consistency Safeguard, or Enhanced Monitoring without

articulating thresholds at the desk.

Stable routing scripts. Partners require a standardized script that converts disputes into

compliance rituals. Scripts must be protected from participant bargaining.

Safe harbor and indemnification. Partners must be shielded from claims arising from refusal or routing executed under propagated permissions.

No binding boundary disclosures. Partners cannot be forced to debate "what counts" at the point of service. Boundary debates produce incidents.

If these requirements are not implemented, consortium members will evaluate withdrawal

from the credential ecosystem and adopt separate internal protocols.

We cannot operate in an environment where staff are asked to improvise morality in public while bearing the liability.

We convene because trust is a condition of access.

The Authority is not merely a set of policies. It is a promise: that the community will not be

governed by intimidation, and that our interventions will be justified by legible standards.

Please confine comments to the procedural scope. We will not indulge theater. We will examine the record.

There are two questions before us.

First: did restricted metadata disseminate beyond authorized channels?

Second: has Review Protocol become, in practice, a stigma label that partners use to ration participation?

If either is true, we must issue corrective directives. If either is false, we must issue findings that protect legitimacy from rumor and panic.

However, review without authority is sermon. We have authority. We will use it.

NOTE ON SOURCES

Note on Sources: The Fractional Fiction Synthesis

Civility Certified synthesizes three public domain texts into original literary work. This note

explains each source and how it functions within the novella.

Source One: Martin Luther's Disputation on the Power of Indulgences (1517)

Commonly known as the 95 Theses, Luther's document challenged the Catholic Church's sale of indulgences, certificates that promised remission of sins in exchange for

payment. Luther argued that the Church had transformed grace into transaction, confession into revenue, and salvation into a commodity accessible only to those who could pay.

Synthesis in the novella:

The "Theses on Definition, Discretion, and the Record" (Exhibit 5.1 and subsequent iterations) directly inherit Luther's structure: numbered propositions challenging institutional authority, posted to the working group's digital door. SCA-0147 functions as

the internal reformer, demanding that the CTAA admit what its "clarity" and "legibility" actually produce.

The remediation pathway mirrors the indulgence system: participants must confess, complete scripted acknowledgments, and demonstrate compliance to restore their status.

"RESTORED" becomes absolution. The remediation script becomes the priest's formula.

The completion percentage becomes the indulgence letter.

Luther's central insight, that institutional language can claim mercy while extracting submission, operates throughout the novella. The CTAA's "stability steps" are indulgences by another name.

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Source Two: Jefferson Davis's Declarations and Addresses (1861)

As President of the Confederate States, Jefferson Davis articulated the legal and moral justifications for secession and the preservation of slavery. His rhetoric deployed the language of states' rights, voluntary association, property protection, and procedural legitimacy to defend an institution of absolute coercion.

Synthesis in the novella:

The CTAA's founding documents, the Community Standards Code, and the Partner Consortium agreements echo the Confederate constitutional structure: a federal authority

negotiating with semi-autonomous partners who demand "local discretion" and "refusal rights." The Partner Consortium Letter (Exhibit 10.9) reads like a threat of secession, prioritizing partner comfort over participant access.

The phrase "voluntary participation" that becomes de facto compulsion mirrors the Confederacy's

"states' rights" language that encoded chattel slavery. The gap between declared principles ("This

is not a moral judgment") and lived experience ("STATUS_ACTIVE ≠ ACCESS_USABLE")

parallels the gap between the Confederacy's constitutional language and its practice.

The bureaucratic defense of the indefensible, the transformation of exclusion into protection, the insistence that the system operates through consent: these are the Confederate declaration's rhetorical strategies, translated into contemporary institutional

speech.

Source Three: Sergei Eisenstein's Battleship Potemkin (1925)

Eisenstein's silent film depicts the 1905 mutiny aboard the Russian battleship Potemkin and the subsequent massacre of civilians on the Odessa Steps. The film pioneered montage editing: meaning created through the juxtaposition of images rather than continuous narrative. Eisenstein's technique transformed documentary footage into

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political argument.

Synthesis in the novella:

The "Reconstructed Integrity Review Packet" frame mirrors Eisenstein's documentary

approach: bureaucratic artifacts assembled into narrative, institutional records that indict

the institution. The structure is montage: memo against memo, status line against lived experience, “service preserved” against “forty minutes in the rain.”

The Chorus Dossiers (participants A through H) function as Eisenstein’s crowd scenes: individual victims whose accumulated suffering creates collective indictment. Each dossier is a fragment. Together, they are the Odessa Steps.

The machine vision description of Jonah waiting outside Side Entrance B (Exhibit 15.3) is

the novella’s most direct Potemkin moment: human suffering rendered as data (“posture

class: seated (non-standard),” “head pitch: downward (approx. 34°),” “precipitation present”). The institution’s camera captures everything and understands nothing. The steps sequence, translated into bureaucratic data capture.

The Synthesis

Fractional Fiction does not quote, adapt, or retell its source materials. It synthesizes them

into something new: a work that could not exist without its sources but is not reducible to

any of them.

Civility Certified takes Luther’s reform structure, Davis’s exclusionary rhetoric, and Eisenstein’s documentary montage and produces a bureaucratic horror novel that belongs to none of these traditions individually. The theses are not Luther’s theses. The institution is not the Confederacy. The structure is not a film.

The synthesis is the work.

The Fractional Fiction Method

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Fractional Fiction is a literary methodology developed by David Boles that synthesizes public domain source materials into original contemporary work.

The method operates on three principles:

1. Public Domain Foundation

Each Fractional Fiction work begins with two or more public domain texts. These may be

literary works, historical documents, speeches, films, or other cultural artifacts whose

copyright has expired. The sources provide structural, rhetorical, or thematic DNA that the synthesis transforms.

2. Transformative Synthesis

The synthesis is not adaptation, quotation, or retelling. The source materials are dissolved and reconstituted into something new. A reader familiar with the sources may recognize their presence; a reader unfamiliar with them will experience a complete and coherent work. The synthesis should be invisible to casual reading and rewarding to close analysis.

3. Contemporary Resonance

Each Fractional Fiction work addresses contemporary concerns through the lens of its historical sources. The past illuminates the present. The synthesis creates critical distance that allows examination of current conditions without polemic or allegory. Civility Certified is the seventh book in the Fractional Fiction series. Previous volumes have synthesized sources including classical rhetoric, early American political documents, Victorian social reform literature, and twentieth-century propaganda. Each volume includes a Note on Sources identifying the public domain materials and explaining their synthesis.

The Fractional Fiction method is open. Other writers are welcome to employ the methodology with proper attribution.

Glossary

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This glossary provides definitions for terminology used within the Civic Trust & Access Authority system depicted in the novella. Terms are defined as the institution uses them;

critical annotations appear in brackets.

Status Lines (Participant-Facing)

Certified (Active) Access remains active. Partner may apply local rules. [The baseline status that means nothing has gone wrong yet.]

Certified (Review Hold) Access remains active. Certain partner services may be delayed pending review. [The first restriction, framed as temporary.]

Certified (Active, Under Review Protocol) Access remains active. Additional stability

steps may apply (scripts, routing, lower-volume windows). Publicly disclosed monitoring

condition. [Restriction acknowledged but not named as restriction.]

Certified (Active, Consistency Safeguard) Partner-facing renaming of Review Protocol.

[Soft-label laundering. Functionally equivalent.]

Certified (Active, Enhanced Monitoring) Access remains active. Monitoring intensified.

Refusal permissions more likely. Alternate entrances and security-supported appointments may be permitted. [The status before revocation, though the institution will

not say so.]

Partner Permissions (Not Participant-Facing)

Routing permitted Partner may reroute participant to alternate intake windows, corridors, or service times. [Denial that refuses to call itself denial.]

Script acknowledgment required Partner may require participant to read and/or sign the Participation Reminder Script before service. [Consent-mimicry that produces compliance as evidence.]

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Refusal right enabled Partner may refuse service without articulating thresholds at the desk. [The permission to deny without explanation.]

Internal Fields (Hidden from Participants)

Monitoring Flag Internal tracking indicator that may later be disclosed as Review Protocol. [The hidden condition that contradicts "RESTORED."]

Association Graph Proximity Correlation score computed from metadata adjacency: device signatures, address overlap, co-occurrence patterns, draft message analysis.

Used for conflict detection and risk adjacency. [The algorithm that identified SCA-0147 and Jonah as siblings.]

Partner Anticipation Structured translation of staff discomfort into an operational signal.

Treated as a "risk-relevant" datapoint. [Fear given procedural authority.]

Risk Posture Operational classification derived from incidents, anticipation logs, and stability signals. Officially "not a moral judgment." [Moral judgment by another name.]

Confidence Score Probability-like metric used to justify procedural certainty. [The number that replaces human judgment while claiming to augment it.]

Propagation Broadcast of status line and permitted partner actions across the partner ecosystem. [How a pharmacy hold becomes a transit restriction becomes a housing flag.]

Organizations and Roles

CTAA (Civic Trust & Access Authority) Program issuer and record-holder. The institution that creates, maintains, and adjudicates the certification system.

SCA (Standards Compliance Analyst) Internal analyst role. Produces and applies standards, routes cases, composes reforms. SCA-0147 is the novel's internal reformer.

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Oversight Audit Office Receives unredacted export bundles. Holds immutable copies. Prepares tribunal binders. The keeper of the complete record.

Integrity Review Tribunal (IRT) Internal body convened for legitimacy events. Produces findings, directives, and sanitized summaries. Procedure as absolution.

Review Chair Leads tribunal proceedings. Anchors legitimacy through procedure and "scope." The dissenting vote.

Counsel-3 Legal representative. Prioritizes defensibility, contracts, safe-harbor, and the integrity of the record over the integrity of the participant.

OpsDirector (Standards Operations Director) Operations leader. Prioritizes flow, friction reduction, partner retention, and predictable throughput. "Partners do not buy truth. They buy predictability."

Liaison-Lead Partner-facing coordination. Translates partner fear into operational requirements.

Recorder Non-voting tribunal role. Converts moral violence into minutes.

Controlled Vocabulary (Institutional Speech)

Legibility Claimed transparency. In practice: visibility of labels without disclosure of thresholds, definitions, or decision criteria. [The appearance of clarity that enables opacity.]

Stability step Sanitized term for restriction, denial, routing, or coercive ritual. [The word

that replaces "punishment."]

Routing Redirection to alternate service windows, locations, or times. Official definition:

capacity management. Functional definition: denial that refuses to call itself denial.

Lower-volume window Delayed service framed as accommodation and care. [The early morning appointment, the side entrance, the security escort.]

Staff comfort Disavowed as a safety criterion in public rhetoric, then re-admitted as “intuition” and logged as “anticipation.” [The feeling that becomes evidence.]

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Participation safety The program’s stated goal. In practice: the safety of the institution from participant challenge.

Moral theater Participant narrative dismissed as performance when it threatens the record’s innocence. [The accusation that silences testimony.]

Ecosystem Monopolistic infrastructure described as a neutral environment. [The word that makes a trap sound like a garden.]

Document Types

Policy memo / tracked changes Language laundering in motion. The revision history of institutional speech.

Dashboard / metrics tile Harm converted into “success.” The numbers that prove the system works.

Script / desk ritual Consent-mimicry that produces compliance as evidence. The words the participant must say.

Tribunal transcript Relevance and scope used as weapons. Procedure replacing morality.

System log The machine speaking in timestamps and queue states. Often the most honest voice in the packet.

CACHE marker Indicates an artifact recovered from local storage rather than official record. The dissident’s unsent drafts.

Questions for Discussion

The following questions are designed for reading groups, classroom use, or individual reflection. They address the novella’s themes, structure, and contemporary resonance.

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On Institutional Language

The CTAA repeatedly insists that its actions are “not a moral judgment.” What work does

this phrase do? When an institution disclaims moral judgment while producing moral

consequences, what is actually happening?

Examine the controlled vocabulary circular (Exhibit 5.5). How does the distinction between “approved” and “prohibited” terms shape what the institution can admit about itself? What becomes unspeakable?

The status line “RESTORED” appears to mean the participant’s access has been returned to normal. What does Exhibit 4.7 (the hidden monitoring flag) reveal about the gap between institutional language and institutional practice?

On Consent and Coercion

The Civility Certified program is described as “voluntary.” At what point in the novella does voluntary participation become de facto compulsion? What mechanisms produce this transformation?

The remediation pathway requires participants to complete scripted acknowledgments. What is the difference between genuine acknowledgment and coerced confession? Can the distinction survive institutional processing?

Jonah signs every script, completes every module, follows every instruction. Why does his compliance fail to protect him? What does this suggest about the relationship between

rule-following and safety in systems like the CTAA?

On the Reformer’s Dilemma

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SCA-0147 attempts to reform the system from within by writing theses, improving definitions, and demanding legibility. The institution responds by operationalizing these reforms into its existing structure. Is internal reform possible? What would genuine reform

require?

The Working Group chair says: “We can prevent drift if we build it into the machine.” What

does this sentence reveal about the institution’s relationship to critique? How does the machine absorb its critics?

SCA-0147’s export of the unredacted bundle triggers the tribunal. Was this an act of sabotage, conscience, or desperation? Does the novella provide evidence for any of these interpretations?

On Bureaucratic Violence

No one in the novella commits physical violence. No one intends harm. Yet Jonah is systematically ground down. How does the novella depict violence that operates through procedure rather than force?

The Participant Cost Ledger (Exhibit 11.13) translates bureaucratic friction into time, money, and bodily experience. What is the cumulative effect of these small deprivations?

How does the ledger function differently than the institution's own metrics?

The machine vision description (Exhibit 15.3) renders Jonah's suffering as data: "posture class," "head pitch," "precipitation present." What is lost in this translation? What is the relationship between data capture and understanding?

On Structure and Form

The novella presents itself as a "Reconstructed Integrity Review Packet." How does this frame shape your experience as a reader? Are you an analyst, an auditor, a participant, or something else?

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The interstitial voice (the compiler's annotations) appears between exhibits. How does this voice differ from the institutional documents? What does it add that the documents alone cannot provide?

The novella has two protagonists: SCA-0147 (the reformer) and Jonah (the participant). How do their stories intersect? What does each reveal that the other cannot?

On Contemporary Resonance

The CTAA is a fictional institution, but its components exist in contemporary life: reputation systems, background checks, algorithmic risk scoring, platform moderation, wellness verification. Which real-world systems does the novella illuminate? Which does it fail to address?

The Partner Consortium demands "actionable refusal rights" and "stable routing scripts."

What real-world pressures produce similar demands? How do institutions balance participant access against partner convenience?

The tribunal vote is 5-1 against the participant. The dissent (ReviewChair) articulates the

moral argument; the majority articulates the operational argument. Which argument wins

in real institutions? Why?

On the Ending

Jonah's last message says: "Keep your record." What does this phrase mean? Is it surrender, defiance, or something else?

The final exhibit is a system log recording the archive lock and role removal. The last line

states: "Participant access is not presumed." Why does the novella end with the machine's voice rather than a human voice?

Does the novella offer hope? If so, where? If not, what does it offer instead?
